The University of Southern Nevada was recently nominated, and won the First Place as the "Best Place to Work" for 2008 in the midsize business category of the Southern Nevada Human Resource Association's Annual "Best Places to Work in Southern Nevada Awards" Luncheon.

The judges recognized USN for its innovative practices for attracting and retaining key talent in a competitive environment as well as many positive examples of inclusion and involvement.

The University's ongoing efforts to recruit and retain top educators from around the world were one of the

decisive factors for receiving the award. In a competitive field like healthcare education,


attracting and retaining the best employees requires innovative approaches and scope for professional development. The University Planning, Priorities and Resources Committee (UPPRC) established a recruitment/retention discretionary fund to provide unit heads with additional monies to be used as incentives to lure highly competent educators as well as providing intramural research grants for new research projects to fund faculty scholarships, has been acknowledged as very innovative techniques to attract professionals.

USN Achieves Regional **ACCREDITATION!**



University of Southern Nevada is proud to announce that it has been granted initial accreditation by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities (NWCCU), one of six recognized regional accrediting organizations in the U.S. that review degreegranting institutions. The accreditation is effective beginning Sept. 1, 2008.

"We are very excited to achieve NWCCU regional accreditation," said USN President Dr. Harry Rosenberg, "The commission's affirmation recognizes USN's unwavering commitment to excellence in education, focus on quality, and commitment to standards and accountability. It also confirms USN's eligibility for participation in federal and state financial aid programs, acceptance and transfer of college credit, and is the prerequisite for starting many graduate and professional programs."

The accreditation follows a comprehensive evaluation process that began in 2005 and included a meticulous self-study process, applying quality indicators developed specifically for higher education institutions by NWCCU to help them evaluate their strengths and challenges. The commission also conducted site visits in 2006, 2007 and, most recently, in October 2008.

NWCCU is an independent, non-profit membership organization recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and the Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA) as the regional authority on educational quality and institutional effectiveness of more than 160 higher education institutions in the seven-state Northwest region of Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, and Washington. - Jason Roth



Nursing Faculty Attend Gerontology Seminar

Regina McFerren and Linda Cox, assistant professors for the College of Nursing, recently attended the Geriatric Nursing Education Consortium's (GNEC) seminar, "Enhancing Gerontology Content in Senior-level Baccalaureate Courses." in St. Louis. The University of Southern Nevada was one of only two colleges from the state of Nevada to have representatives in attendance.

"There was a wealth of information presented in this recent specialized realm of Gerontology," said McFerren. "It was exciting to be at the forefront of this segment of nursing."

The GNEC provided the seminar largely due to a grant from the John A. Hartford Foundation's Institute for Geriatric Nursing. GNEC has a Faculty Development Institute which provides a plethora of education and information related to Gerontology, which is the scientific study of aging and its effects. New information and resources especially related to Evidence Based Practice and application principles used in nursing was also presented.

"We already incorporate a lot of Gerontology in our medicalsurgical classes, so based on what we learned, it was reaffirming to know we are on the right track in educating our students," said

Upcoming Events for the DAAT

This year interest in the Drug Abuse Awareness Team (DAAT) has grown to phenomenal proportions. There are now 60 student members. During the fall, the team presented to Bridger Middle School (December 16), Keller Middle School (December 15) and Woodbury Middle School (November 26).

This spring, the team will be very active giving presentations to local schools and participating in community events. On January 21, the DAAT will present to the students and parents of Roger Brown Elementary School at their Just Ask Event, which is a program designed for parents and students to get information on the social issues that adolescents may face. On January 23, the team has two events scheduled. In the morning Dr. Oesterman and Darlene Banzaf

will be presenting to health teachers from each school in the Clark County School District at the Health and Driver Safety Awareness Event at Silverado High School, and then in the afternoon they will be presenting to the teachers of Miley Elementary School. These presentations will educate the teachers about the signs and symptoms of drug abuse and the trends in the drug abuse in our community.

The DAAT has a tremendous opportunity to present at the Spring Valley High School Parent and Student Drug Awareness Night with the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department and the Narcotic Education Foundation of Nevada on February 19. This event will be for an audience of 500 and there will be nationally recognized organizations such as D.A.R.E. and M.A.D.D. as well as the media in attendance.

In addition, the DAAT has a variety of interesting opportunities for the spring. The DAAT will give two more student presentations before the end of the academic year, on March 2 at Washington Continuing Education and May 4 at Woodbury Middle School. The DAAT has been asked to educate the Clark County School District Administrators about the signs and symptoms of drug abuse and the current trends in adolescent drug abuse on March 31.

In conjunction with the USN Student Alliance, the DAAT will give a drug information seminar for Stork's Nest/ZHOPE which is an educational program/outreach service for expectant mothers in their first trimester of pregnancy. RUNCHES PRIHODONTIC RESIDENCY ROGRAM





After receiving initial accreditation by the Commission on Dental Accreditation, the University of Southern Nevada College of Dental Medicine officially launched its first postdoctoral dental residency program, Advanced Education in Orthodontics and Dentofacial Orthopedics (AEODO), combined with a Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree.

An inaugural class of nine residents are enrolled in the three-year, postdoctoral dental program that trains dentists to become specialists in orthodontics and dentofacial orthopedics as well as business. The residents, all fully licensed dentists in the State of Nevada, will be teamed with board certified orthodontic faculty to provide high-quality and affordable orthodontic care in a state-of-the-art facility to the residents of Henderson and the surrounding Southern Nevada community, which includes Las Vegas.

"We are extremely proud to see our plan to launch an advanced education dental residency program come to fruition," said Dr. Harry Rosenberg, University of Southern Nevada's founding president. "The university and College of Dental Medicine administration, as well as the faculty and staff, have worked extremely hard to ensure this program meets the highest academic standards, while also ensuring that orthodontic services offered to the community will be outstanding."

The College of Dental Medicine operates in a 12,000 square-foot facility located at 4 Sunset Way, Building C in Henderson. The clinic is equipped with the latest in technology, including patient management systems and Cone Beam CT imaging equipment. It also contains a high-tech "mission control" where faculty can observe patient care via high-definition cameras at each chair. The cameras record video and still images that can be displayed on large high-definition flat panel monitors to share best practices with all residents, or recorded and utilized at a later time as additional educational tools. They will also be used to conduct distance learning, both live and recorded.

According to Dr. David Grove, associate professor, the College of Dental Medicine's goal is to provide a totally paperless clinical operation, utilizing state-of-the-art orthodontic practice management and imaging solutions to facilitate quality care to our patients and an innovative education for our residents.

"University of Southern Nevada is known as an innovator for its use of technology in the classrooms," said Dr. C. Lynn Hurst, dean of the College of Dental Medicine and AEODO/MBA program director. "We've carried that innovation over into the orthodontic clinic, creating a truly impressive facility."

The college is now offering free screenings and consultations to the public and will begin treating patients in March, providing a full array of orthodontic services for children, adolescents (teens) and adults.

"We plan to treat between 300 and 400 patients in our first year of operation," said Dr. Hurst. "We're extremely confident that the public will respond to our focus on affordability, accessibility and quality of care."

In the meantime, the residents have begun their AEODO/ MBA courses and training. Like all of University of Southern Nevada's academic programs, courses are taught using the university's revolutionary block curriculum system, a learning format developed to emphasize a student-centered, active-learning environment where students/residents participate in experiential education from the very beginning of their programs. Rather than multiple courses spread out through semesters or quarters, the curriculum is organized into blocks which allow students/residents to focus on one subject at a time. Additionally, utilization of the block curriculum allows for the students/residents to be taught by some of the world's most renowned experts in their respective fields, another unique aspect of their education at USN College of Dental Medicine.



The block system format also provides opportunities for students/residents to be active participants in the learning process by facilitating the incorporation of a variety of learning activities other than the traditional lecture format. The early clinical experiences are designed to enhance and support the didactic curriculum by allowing students/residents to actually see, feel, and understand what is presented in the classroom in an actual clinical setting.

The University's block system also requires students/residents to achieve a 90 percent on assessments for each block, ensuring an unprecedented level of competency in all its graduates.

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"The cornerstone of USN's mission is to produce top-quality graduates who are highly competent, caring, and ethical professionals capable of dealing with the daily demands, challenges and rewards of contemporary orthodontic practice and business, who are well prepared to step into the future of healthcare, armed with confidence, knowledge and professionalism," said Dr. Hurst. "Our 90 percent passing requirement is designed to ensure our residents accomplish this."

The University of Southern Nevada College of Pharmacy, the university's first academic program, has seen tremendous success with the block curriculum system. For the past three years the college's Doctor of Pharmacy graduates have consistently and significantly exceeded the national pass-rate on the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy Licensure Examination (NAPLEX).

"We're extremely confident our graduates will achieve the same level of success as the university's pharmacy graduates," said Dr. Hurst.

According to Dr. Jaleh Pourhamidi, associate professor and director of student affairs, the residents currently enrolled in the program were recruited in spring 2008. Since summer, the residents have been fully immersed in the University of Southern Nevada's Master of Business Administration program.

"Since the vast majority of dental professionals end up as the CEO's of their own small companies, we felt it was essential to equip them with the knowledge and skills necessary to be successful in business as well as orthodontics," said Dr. Pourhamidi. "Our AEODO/MBA residency program is the first in the nation to require an MBA to develop residents' legal, ethical and financial competency, all of which are essential in operating a successful practice in today's complex health care business environment."


The residents have completed three quarters of their MBA curriculum and will complete the remaining courses throughout the remainder of their education at the University of Southern Nevada's College of Dental Medicine.

While the USN College of Dental Medicine has worked diligently to launch the program, it has already begun the recruitment and interview process for a new class of residents and interns to begin in July 2009. "Our plan is to enroll ten residents and three interns this summer," said Dr. Pourhamidi.

The college is also looking into the future with plans to expand its dental education program offerings, says Dr. Hurst.

"We're carefully examining many opportunities," adds Dr. Hurst. "We're also exploring the possibility of expanding the College of Dental Medicine to the university's South Jordan, Utah campus."

"We see tremendous potential for the College of Dental Medicine," said Dr. Rosenberg. "The AEODO/MBA residency program complements the university's mission to prepare competent professionals and to address the health care needs of Nevada and the entire Intermountain region through innovative educational programs, scholarship and public service."



The University of Southern Nevada College of Dental Medicine is now recruiting children, adolescents (teens) and adults to participate as patients in the newly launched orthodontic residency.

The college is offering a free screening and consultation, which includes an examination to qualify patients who are candidates for orthodontic treatment (braces). Qualified patients will be scheduled for diagnostic records and may begin orthodontic treatment as early as March. Following the start of treatment, routine appointments will typically be scheduled every four to six weeks at the college's clinic located at 4 Sunset Way, Building C in Henderson.

According to Dr. C. Lynn Hurst, dean of the College of Dental Medicine, patients will receive affordable, high-quality orthodontic treatment from a team that includes both a resident doctor, fully licensed by the Nevada State Board of Dental Examiners, and board certified orthodontist faculty.

"In receiving treatment at the USN College of Dental Medicine, patients will have the benefit of a highly skilled team offering the latest technology and practices used to correct orthodontic and dentofacial orthopedic discrepancies, such as crooked teeth and jaws," said Dr. Hurst. "They'll also receive treatment at a very affordable cost."

Typically braces can cost \$6,000 or more, but the college will offer braces, as well as other orthodontic treatments, to patients for as little as guarter to half of those fees. The college also accepts most dental insurance plans, including Medicaid, and will provide affordable payment plans.

DISCARD UNUSED MEDICINES SAFELY

The start of a new year is a good time to check your medicine cabinet to see if any medicines have expired. Medications, whether prescribed by a doctor or purchased over-the-counter, should be discarded by their expiration date, as medicines may lose their effectiveness or even become toxic over time.

In the past, many people flushed old medicines down the toilet to prevent children or pets from finding and accidentally ingesting medicines from the trash. However, the Environmental Protection Agency no longer recommends flushing medicines, as sewage treatment plants may not be able to clean all medications out of the water.

Taking just a few small steps can keep your family and our environment safe from expired medications.

- When discarding unused medications, take precautions to protect children and pets from potentially harmful effects. The American Pharmaceutical Association (APhA) recommends that consumers crush solid medications or dissolve them in water and mix with kitty litter, coffee grounds, or sawdust (or any material that absorbs the dissolved medication), then place in a sealed plastic bag BEFORE tossing in the trash.
- Liquid medications should be self "treated" in some way to stop animals or children from ingesting them. A simple way to do this is to add salt, ashes from a fireplace or barbecue, or dirt from your yard to make medications less appealing.
- Wrap several layers of masking tape or duct tape to cover and hide blister packs (pills in a card). It is also smart to put medications in the trash as close to the pick-up time as possible to decrease the likelihood of the medicine falling into the wrong hands.

- Take the original medication container with safety caps, if available, and tape the lid to the container with duct tape or other type of sturdy tape. Use a plastic container (bleach container) when getting rid of liquid medicines to prevent spills from broken glass bottles. Conceal all medications in an additional container such as a paper bag, box, or plastic tub. Finish by wrapping in several layers of newspaper to avoid discovery and potential removal from the trash.
- Remove and destroy all identifying personal information from the prescription label on the medication container. Don't forget to remove your name, drug name, prescription number and other personal information from the container before disposal.

Additionally, your neighborhood pharmacy may provide safe disposal devices/services. You may be able to take your unused medications to your community pharmacy.

Your local pharmacist is a great resource when it comes to questions on unused and expired medications. Research shows that pharmacists are one of the most accessible health care professionals. As the medication expert on the health care team, pharmacists are available to guide you on how to properly dispose of your unused medications.

"More than half the people who abuse prescription pain killers indicate that they got their prescription drugs from a friend or relative for free. Proper disposal of unwanted, outdated, or unused medications will help minimize access to these products by people for whom they were not intended," said Dr. Paul Oesterman, assistant professor of pharmacy practice with the College of Pharmacy.

Following these simple steps can help protect your family and community, minimize a potential negative impact on the environment, and prevent the illegal use and dispersion of unused medications.

The Multimedia Systems Analyst is responsible for this entire area. Currently, his main projects include portraits, event photography, and coordinating and testing the technology equipment for the College of Dental Medicine's new location.

4. Project Management


